

Advent is upon us once again. This strange season of the church year asks us to wait and watch with expectation. It is a difficult season for us to observe in a world that wants nothing to do with waiting. Perhaps part of this disconnect is that in our time we think of waiting as time passing while doing nothing. A waste of time. But Advent is not a season of inactivity.

Of course the waiting of Advent is related to the waiting for birth. We know that such waiting is preparatory time. The mother's body is changing and preparing. The expectant household is likewise changing and preparing. There are items we purchase to help with the care of an infant. Choosing a space for the expected child to sleep; maybe decorating a special room, if such a space is available. Changing table and crib and diapers (will they be "real" or disposable?) and receiving blankets, and clothing, and a baby monitor, car seats and travel bags and more, so much more! However did people survive having a child without all these essentials?

There are friends and relatives who likewise help with preparations, hosting baby showers, preparing meals to be pulled from the freezer, offers to care for the dog. Parents soon to be new grandparents extend an invitation to come and help once the baby comes home. And of course there are the classes to complete and the hospital tour, so you know where you are going when the time comes.

Is this all that Advent is? A nostalgic look back at our own experience with childbirth? Advent is not simply looking back but is also forward looking. We look back just enough to remember God's promises kept in time past so that we can anticipate God's promises kept in time to come. As the birth of our children is not the end goal, but rather life together growing forward within our changed household, so our life with God in Christ Jesus is about life growing forward. And not simply for our own sake.

Jesus' birth was not just a momentous event in the life of the household of Mary and Joseph. It was part of the pivot point of God's interaction with humanity. It was not an event that ended with swaddling clothes and hay in the manger. A cross would one day come into this life. And Jesus' life taken as a whole is a life through which God speaks love to the world. Love spoken in the language of human experience so all would know that God is acting on behalf of the world.

May this Advent and Christmas time include remembering our experiences of Christmases past. May they also move us to look forward to a time when the promise of Christ's birth is more real than ever: Peace to all whom God loves. And while we wait, let us live out of this promise of God's love for the sake of the world. Let our neighbors see how real this promise is in our life, and their life too.

It's Better to Give Safely

We've all heard it's important when choosing toys for infants or small children to avoid small parts that might prove to be a choking hazard. Here are some additional gift-related safety tips:

- Select gifts for older adults that are not heavy or awkward to handle
- Be aware of dangers associated with coin lithium batteries; of particular concern is the ingestion of button batteries

Watch Out for Those Fire-starters

Candles and Fireplaces - Thousands of deaths are caused by fires, burns and other fire-related injuries every year, and 12% of home candle fires occur in December, the National Fire Protection Association reports. Increased use of candles and fireplaces, combined with an increase in the amount of combustible, seasonal decorations present in many homes means more risk for fire.

- Never leave burning candles unattended or sleep in a room with a lit candle
- Keep candles out of reach of children
- Make sure candles are on stable surfaces
- Don't burn candles near trees, curtains or any other flammable items
- Don't burn trees, wreaths or wrapping paper in the fireplace
- Check and clean the chimney and fireplace area at least once a year

Don't Give the Gift of Food Poisoning

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services provides some holiday food safety tips. Here are a few:

- Do not rinse raw meat and poultry before cooking
- Use a food thermometer to make sure meat is cooked to a safe temperature
- Refrigerate food within two hours
- Thanksgiving leftovers are safe for four days in the refrigerator
- Bring sauces, soups and gravies to a rolling boil when reheating
- When storing turkey, cut the leftovers in small pieces so they will chill quickly
- Wash your hands frequently when handling food

Monthly Blood Pressure Checks

Don't forget that we offer free blood pressure checks following our worship service once a month. The next free blood pressure check will be on Sunday, December 2nd.

Long Term (Strategic) Planning Group

The LOTV Church Council seeks to assure congregation resources are allocated in a responsible and judicious manner. This is relatively straightforward process on a short-term basis, but becomes more complex as future needs are considered. Much as a family should plan for retirement or children's future educational needs; the Council must try to anticipate and (when possible) affect future events that will likely require significant resource commitments. The fact that we have a life altering Mission together: "That We May Know, Live and Share the Love of Christ", greatly increases the importance of longer term planning.

During the last fourteen years LOTV has developed a Long Term Plan every 3-5 years. Our last Long Term Plan was created in 2013. At the Church Council Meeting on November 12, it was decided to embark on another Long Term (Strategic) Plan, targeting completion in time for our next Annual Congregational Meeting.

Strategic Planning requires broad congregational involvement from members, parish partners and non-members. Such participation is necessary to assure the resulting strategy is adequately comprehensive, sufficiently contemplative of probable significant trends, and capitalizes on LOTV strengths. Because the plan will be used to set our direction for the next 3-5 years, and deploy our strengths to improve our congregation and community, it is imperative that widespread participation occurs.

The Council would like to create a Lona Term (Strategic) Planning Group composed of a few Council members, 3-5 representatives from the broader congregation, and some contribution from those who regularly interact with LOTV missions or activities. Formal activities should begin after Epiphany (January 6), presuming we can identify membership on the Strategic Planning Group soon.

Enjoy a Safe Holiday Season

Holiday safety is an issue that burns brightest from late November to mid-Ianuary. when families gather, parties are scheduled and travel spikes. Take some basic precautions to ensure your family remains safe and injury-free throughout the season.

Traveling for the Holidays? Be Prepared

Many people choose to travel during the holidays by automobile, with the highest fatality rate of any major form of transportation. In 2015, 355 people died on New Year's Day, 386 on Thanksgiving Day and 273 on Christmas Day, according to Injury Facts 2017. Alcoholimpaired fatalities represent about one-third of the totals.

- Use a designated driver to ensure guests make it home safely after a holiday party: alcohol, over-the-counter or illegal drugs all cause impairment. Make sure every person in the vehicle is properly buckled up no matter how long or short the distance traveled
- Put that cell phone away; many distractions can occur while driving, but cell phones are the main culprit
- Properly maintain the vehicle and keep an emergency kit with you
- Be prepared for heavy traffic, and possibly heavy snow

Even Angel Hair can Hurt

Decorating is one of the best ways to get in a holiday mood, but emergency rooms see thousands of injuries involving holiday decorating every season.

- "Angel hair," made from spun glass, can irritate your eyes and skin; always wear gloves or substitute non-flammable cotton
- Spraying artificial snow can irritate your lungs if inhaled; follow directions carefully
- Decorate the tree with your kids and pets in mind; move ornaments that are breakable or have metal hooks toward the top
- Always use the proper step ladder; don't stand on chairs or other furniture
- Lights are among the best parts of holiday decorating; make sure there are no exposed or frayed wires, loose connections or broken sockets, and don't overload vour electrical circuits
- Plants can spruce up your holiday decorating, but keep those that may be poisonous (including some Poinsettias) out of reach of children or pets; the national Poison Control Center can be reached at (800) 222-1222
- Make sure paths are clear so no one trips on wrapping paper, decorations, toys, etc.; NSC provides tips for older adults on slip, trip and fall protection

Water Filters

Clean water is one of our focuses making a difference between life and death for children of rural Nicaraguan families. Our plan is to partner with ERSLA (Emergency Response Services for Latin America), a nonprofit organization. ERSLA manages the donations and volunteers: they coordinate the purchase of the filters from the manufacture "Potters For Peace", transportation to the Somoto area, they determine a community who could benefit from the water filters. Mission Nicaragua Team helps ERSLA and local firefighters to distribute the water filters. Our goal is to purchase 100 filters, each filter costs \$50.00.
