

We are in that transitional season of spring. One day it is very much like spring, and the next we are back into winter. Or perhaps both on the same day, as is the forecast as I write this. One moment I am thinking about pulling out the planters for our deck and planting flowers and the next moment I am lighting a fire in the wood stove to ward off the chill. I keep the snow shovels handy with hopes they will go unused. This time of transition reflects life and faith.

Often we are impacted by the unexpected and must deal with the consequences. It may be a change in health. It might be the preparations required because one of the kids will be graduating and leaving for college. We might find ourselves scrambling to arrange child care for the summer since school will be ending in a month or so. Or that vehicle that has been steadily adding up the miles is now making suggestions that a change is coming.

Through the changes and transitions in our lives we do have one constant. God in Christ reminds us that God is with us always. In life and in death, when we are up and when we drop down, God is with us. God chooses not to walk away when life throws us a curve. God does not leaves us in the deep hardship or grief that comes. Rather, as promised, God remains, steadfast. Now we may sense God's presence and recognize God's promise fulfilled; but sometimes what we face can be so overwhelming that we lose our focus. Sometimes the need in front of us demands so much of us that we simply do what we can to move through the chaos. Yet not alone.

Sometimes, God brings a concrete reminder of God's promised presence. Often through a neighbor or a friend who walks through our challenge with us. Or a weekly service of worship where we are reminded of promises and taste grace. Or we find ourselves in a conversation and the subject shifts to encouragement, maybe without our even having mentioned our predicament. Some find a reminder in the beauty of creation which surrounds us. Others seek out a time to read scripture and the stories of people of faith from long ago remind us that others too have wondered and wandered and experienced having been led by God without being aware.

Sometimes, in transitions in our life and faith, we do well to seek out people or a person to share in our time of uncertainty. Yes, we can seek help. It is not a weakness to ask, to seek. Jesus has even invited such from us. And has given us permission to do so even as he taught us to pray, "Our Father.' Not my Father, but Our Father. We are not in this life and faith alone, not meant to be either. Let us seek out the community of God's people and walk together through challenging transitions, and celebrate together God's promises fulfilled. God is with us, Jesus is risen from the dead, and God will not leave or forsake us. We are sisters and brothers in Christ. Let us hold on to one another and when needed, hold up one another.

- 3) Stirring, Helpful Worship The congregations shares in worship that is warm and welcoming. It begins upon arrival and continues until departure. Often there is a sense of gathering and enthusiasm among those who are present; it feels like people want to be here ... they long to share with one another. The music is inspiring and dynamic and links with the overall service in a supportive manner, and this provides a sense of balance. The service has moments that touch the heart, stir the mind, lift the soul; hopefully people leave the liturgy with concrete help that will support them in the coming week to live in the grace of God.
- 4) Significant Relational Groupings The groupings within the congregation are open, inclusive, warm and welcoming. New groupings are encouraged. The groupings within the congregation allow people to discover a depth of sharing and caring that proves meaningful. There is a healthy balance between one-time, seasonal, short-term, long-term and weekly, monthly, year-round groupings.
- 5) **Strong Leadership Team** The congregation focuses on achievements (objectives) not activities. Those who lead in the congregation exhibit behaviors that communicate: (1) *love* for those they hope to lead; (2) actively *listening* to what those they want to lead have to say (including what they may not say); (3) *learn* from their listening and; (4) and because of these traits the leaders are seen as having integrity, they have earned the trust and mutual respect of those they hope to lead. The congregational leaders take the trust they have earned and help people fulfill their own, personal, most pressing current life searches for: grace, compassion, sense of community (belonging), individuality, life meaning and hope.
- 6) Solid Decision Process Decisions are thoughtful, wise and are consistent with the key objectives of the congregation. A strong sense of openness with the congregation allows honest and thoughtful informal conversations where basic agreement develops and is eventually recognized through a formal process. A spirit of integrity, mutual respect and trust in one another forms as the solid decision process operates, and this further strengthens the congregation.

Next month we will examine the 6 functional characteristics in greater depth.

Planning Our Future Together / Part 2

The LOTV Strategic Planning Group is using Dr. Kennon Callahan's approach to ecumenical Strategic Planning as presented in his book entitled: **Twelve Keys to an Effective Church** (Josesey-Bass 2010). This is the second of three summaries that are based on Dr. Callahan's work and intended to help inform everyone regarding the foundations of the approach.

Basic Premises of Our Planning Approach:

- We live in the grace of God.
- Going to church is not viewed as a prevailing component of life as it was 2 to 3 generations back.
- The role of compassion and sense of community have become far more important to individual motivation because of this changed outlook about church attendance, than do "challenges" to one's conscience or appeals for "commitment".
- Likewise, service to the larger community becomes more crucial than do direct efforts to increase attendance or membership.
- Effective churches honestly examine their strengths relative to the key relational and functional characteristics. They then develop a plan to build upon their strengths in a manner consistent with their overall mission and *one major mission outreach*.

Six Key Relational Characteristics:

- 1) One Major Mission Outreach The effective church embraces it's strength and this is reflected in the primary mission the church supports within the community. The mission directly helps people and groupings in the community, and when the mission is done well, the church will become legendary because of the undertaking. Successful missions typically address human hurts and hopes, often focus on life stages, frequently reflect common interest within the congregation, and address concerns within the community. This "primary mission focus" helps the congregation most effectively apply the strength God's grace has provided, for the benefit of their community.
- 2) **Shepherding Visitation** Spiritual support, care and guidance (shepherding) is not just the role for the Pastor but extends to all in the congregation. It may occur almost anywhere, at nearly any time but is often observed in hospitals, with homebound people, within independent & assisted living facilities, and in nursing homes. It may take the form of a personal discussion, phone call, a note, e-mail, a text-message and can occur in a small or large group gatherings. It is gentle, kind, encouraging and unselfish; it is helpful and hopeful, extended with compassion and wisdom, integrity and honesty. It restores one's soul.

The information already collected by the SPG regarding the existing 23 LOTV missions, programs and activities will be relevant as we work to specify the key strength we want to *build upon* and the key strength we want to *bring along*. The LOTV Strategic Planning Group (SPG) report summarizing findings about our 23 programs, missions and activities is now available for review at the back of the sanctuary.

The "community trend" information collected by the SPG is being summarized and salient trends specified. This document, along with supporting details collected, will also be made available at the back of the church in the next few weeks. This information will be very helpful as we endeavor to identify the key strength we decide to *build upon* and the one we elect to *bring along*.
